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with excellent results. What I learned was DO NOT use ISOPROPYL ALCOHOL! Everywhere the alcohol was used, the record was ruined. This lovely record now has about 1 square inch of surface. Should have gone a last patch on the blank back side first. A further suggestion.

I used my drying cloth from washing other records. So it's not mildly damp. I slowly go over the record avoiding any splits or edges and wipe off dirt. Takes a few minutes per record. There's no residual water so little chance it will get soaked into the record. The next time it sits in the racks is completely and dry or in flat on table. Never had any with them getting ruined, more warped, etc.

DO NOT use alcohol of ANY variety to "clean" shellac-based compounds soluble in ANY alcohol! Long-term exposure damage a record. Normal cleaning involved very short-term exposure to no damage at all.

I've cleaned my records for decades with Dawn. After putting disc to be cleaned on a paper towel on a large bread board on my kitchen counter. I apply a few drops of Dawn to a clothish sponge and light scrub the record surface. I use a very fine toothbrush to clean the grooves. Starting at the outer edge, I work my way in and this going counter clockwise, turning the record as I go so I clean the playing surface. In doing so, I apply very little pressure and a minimum amount of soap. There is no slick to him. I then dry my hands not to get any wet on the label and rinse the record with luke-warm water. Then dry it with two soft towels: one to get off the water; the second make sure the surfaces are absolutely dry. It's simple and it works. Cleaning each and every record. And I'll be happy to help you and upgrade the playability by at least a half-step.

I use Ajax dish soap, close to the same thing. I mix about a teaspoon of soap in a small cup of water. Warm water. I use tap water because it has chlorine in it. I use a soft toothbrush in this solution and work it around the record, first one direction then the other. If the record has a fiber core I do not wash it. I rinse and pat them dry with paper towels, and stack them with paper towels between them. Make sure the records are completely dry. I use a 25 inch brass brazing rod. Make sure the rod does not have any threads on it. I place the records about one inch apart, so they don't touch during drying. I can get 20 records on the rod before much. I tested a few 78s before doing this. It reduced the all cases. I also blowed a couple of 78s after cleaning with
