Introduction to textured hair



La Mettrie et al (2007)

- Due to the inherent fibre geometry, the fibres are misaligned
- The hair curl is due to a bilateral distribution cortical cells
- Partial alignment, referred to as curl definition, is often desirable
- Water cause fibres to contract and loose the alignment achieved via styling
- Hair fragility due to uneven distribution of torsional and bending forces across fibre's cross sectionally and longitudinally








Hair ageing

- Hair ageing: reduction/loss of melanin production, follicle miniaturisation, slowing hair growth
- High curl types have lower grey hair intensity that other hair types at the same age
- Daily growth rate of curly hair is lower than that of straight hair


Hair as a personal and social attribute

Hair is a subject of intensive studies in the fields of sociology; traditionally studies have focused on colour and length as signifiers of fertility, strength, even molarity

Body ageing satisfaction studies specifically refer to hair being used as a compensatory mechanism for other manifestation of ageing, possibly because of its malleability

Highlights

 Hair colour had weak correlations with hair positivity

□ Hair length and texture had stronger correlation coefficients with hair positivity



Conclusions

Managing hair greying is of high relevance and hair colouring remains common after age of 60

 Cultural identity assertation has led the women to choosing Afrocentric hair styles, however a shift to practicality is intertwined with the cultural and aesthetic values

■ Wellbeing is expressed through education and control over choices, but not directly associated with "natural" hair styles









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
