

Etymology of empathy

From Oxford Languages



Early 20th century: from Greek empatheia (from em- 'in' + pathos 'feeling') translating German Einfühlung Sympathy – 16^{th} century

GREEK ROOTS:

Em = in feeling – i.e in an other's place (requires imagination, contains distance) Sym = together – i.e with feeling – pity or sorrow for others' troubles (shared experience)

To love extension...is to love the thingly quality of the other, in the ultimate, Cartesian sense: to respect what is truly other about the other. (Morton, 2007, 179)



Distance - stand distant, distantia – 'a standing apart' – the property created by the space between two objects or points Middle English – Discord, debate








The Red Wilderness, 2021, 75x48cm, oil and metal leaf on linen
