

FASHION AND FOOD

Fashion and food, two conspicuous staples of our everyday life, are so conspicuous that their similarities and differences are often taken for granted. The annual symposium of the research centre for Fashion, the Body & Material Cultures at the ICA in June 2009 unpacked this theme with relish. Fashionable food, trendy diets, stylish recipes, elegant displays of bodies and products were critically and creatively addressed to map out the many layers, strands and nodes that interconnect between fashion and food.

This issue of Fieldstudy offers some images and texts by which we can start thinking through this relation. Fashion and food are shown to weave people, objects, memories and spaces together, and the photographs, drawings and words featured document these deep connections. The bonds that exist between things and bodies, objects and subjects are evoked and reassert the centrality of both fashion and food to corporality, biography, stories and history.

This symposium offers food for thought about the celebratory and contradictory nature of fashion's relationship with all things edible.

While haute cuisine and haute couture offer elevated examples of how produce, products and processes can be combined and consumed as cultural confections, we retain a taste for cheap clothes and inexpensive food.

The changing style of our eating habits can be traced amongst other things to the discourse of creative cooking and entertaining promoted by fashion magazines, yet these same titles stand accused of peddling fashionable diets and the denial of food as a source of pleasure and possibility.


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
